As the 2014-2015 fiscal year comes to an end, we are pleased to report that this was a year of progress, change and opportunity for Langley Hospice. We set ambitious goals and, with unwavering focus, delivered innovative grief/bereavement programming and support services throughout the community and at the hospice residence. Our dedicated staff and volunteers continue to provide compassionate support to help people live with dignity and hope while coping with grief and the end of life.

We've experienced some staffing changes over the past year, starting with the retirement of Executive Director, Sandra Castle. Sandra's dedication and passion helped to bring Langley Hospice to where it is today - well-respected and financially stable. We will always be immensely grateful for the work and lasting legacy Sandra has provided. Second Story Treasures Thrift Store also saw some changes over the year. We have a fabulous new team in place now, whose inventive efforts have shown positive results in revenue - please be sure to read their report!

Our Supportive Program Centre continues to provide bereavement and support services to anyone in the community experiencing the loss of a loved one. Our children and youth program has expanded its reach in the community, especially within the Langley school districts. In addition, workshops including one specifically for parents of grieving children were successfully delivered. Adult Bereavement saw the implementation of the Supportive Steps Walking Group - truly a unique and fabulous way to connect with others experiencing a loss. Our Palliative Program continues to provide great training to those wishing to volunteer

at the Residence or with Adult Bereavement.

Community engagement and awareness has provided Langley Hospice with many new opportunities. The work of the Society is being brought forward in a tremendously positive way through the media, events and by word of mouth. We are so pleased to be able to provide the support services we offer and are committed to serving the needs of our community for many more years to come.

All of the tremendous efforts of our staff and volunteers and the effect we have on those we serve was recognized by the Greater Langley Chamber of Commerce, when we were awarded the Community Impact Award. The award recognizes outstanding contribution to the community through innovation, growth and effective human resource management. We are humbled by this recognition and sincerely thank the Chamber for this great honour.

Compassion, caring, support - these are the words I hear most from individuals and families as they share their experience of Langley Hospice. Whether it is through our Adult or Child & Youth Bereavement Programs, Hospice Residence or simply by connecting with another staff member, they are immensely grateful for the work being undertaken throughout the Society.

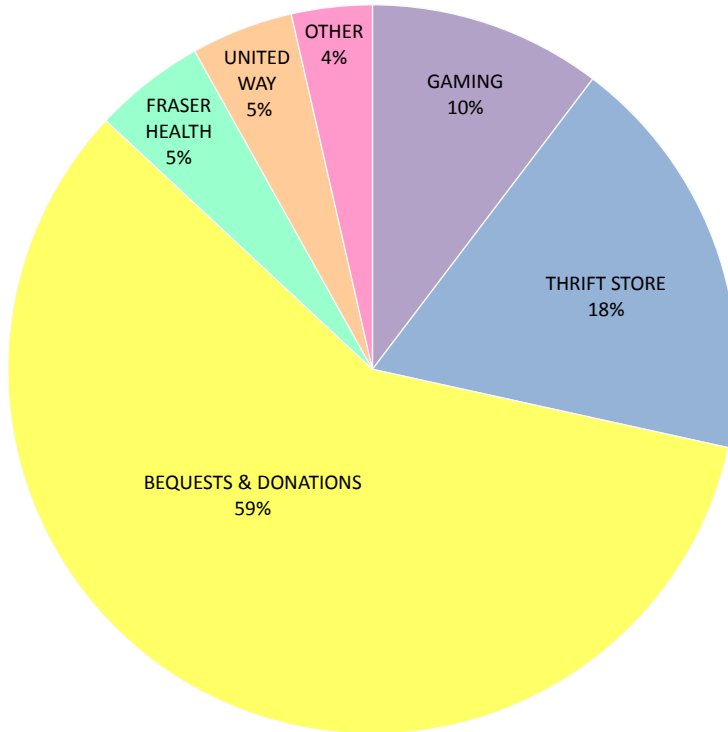

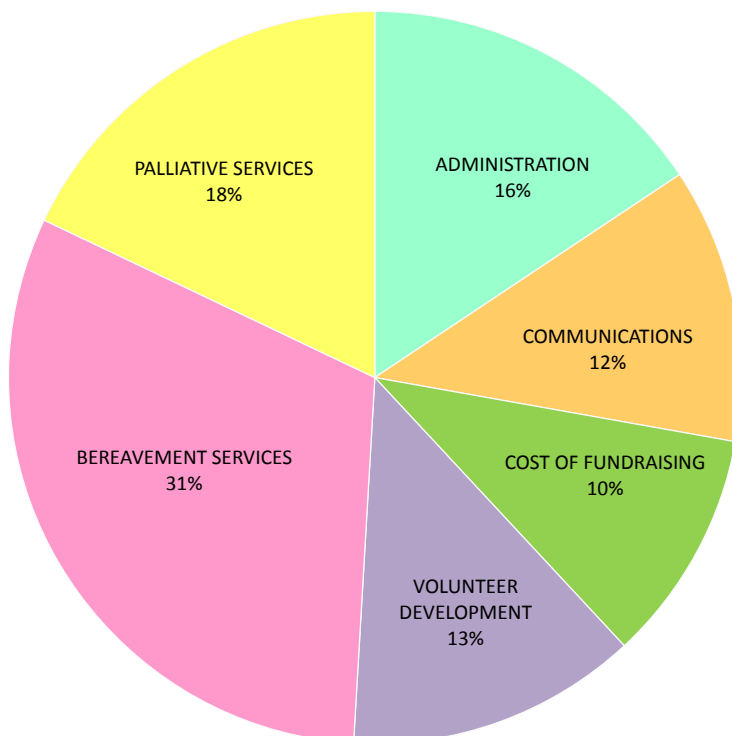

Adult Bereavement Support

As a result of an increase in community awareness and word-of-mouth testimonials from previous clients, the Adult Bereavement Program experienced an **increase in both office (+70) and community (+30) clients** in 2014. Approximately 85% of the clients were self-referred or referred by a previous client, with many stating that loved ones had an extremely positive experience with utilizing our various services for adults.

Due to an increase in volunteer availability and acquiring a student from Adler University, the Adult Program was able to provide five **loss-support groups** (most hospice societies provide two annually). Three of these groups were for general loss, one was for loss of a spouse and our most recent group was for those who have lost a parent. By providing various types of settings throughout the year, individuals were able to participate in a group that provided them with comfort and normalization, at a time that was most convenient for them.

The program's biggest success of the year was the creation and highly utilized adult walking group, **Supportive Steps**. The group started with seven participants and has now grown to over thirty walkers. The one year anniversary celebration consisted of 25 participants who enjoyed a walk around Langley and potluck lunch to follow. This group has been featured in The Langley Advance and JoyTV.

In November, we provided a workshop on **Coping with Grief during the Holidays**, which was attended by 25 participants. Our annual memorialization event, **Journeying through the Holidays**, hosted fifty community individuals, including four attendees who had never utilized our services before. As a result of their attendance, these individuals eventually utilized 1:1 services, group settings, and are now avid walkers for Supportive Steps.

We also enjoyed participating in **30 Days of Kindness** for the second year in a row. On this day, we provided 50 community members with "kindness bags" at Otter Coop. Bags consisted of a water bottle, gift certificates to athletic facilities in Langley, and a list of ways to be kind to oneself and others. Although we did not fundraise during this occasion, we kindly received over \$50 in donations.

Child & Youth Bereavement Support

In addition to the 267 one-to-one bereavement support sessions and 40 family group sessions, seven children and teen loss support groups, four day camps, a four-day annual summer grief camp, parenting workshops and support, *Supporting Grieving Children* training workshops, and the school-based presentations and workshops that are a regular part of our services., this year's Child and Youth Bereavement Support Program saw many new features and faces

The hiring of part-time Child and Youth Bereavement Support Worker, Cassidy Peters, made it possible for us to provide continuity of care and support to the children accessing our support services, as well as offer some new valuable programs, events, and activities for the children and teens. It also afforded us the time to provide more education and support to community and caregivers, and build stronger connections throughout the community.

Our Children and Youth Bereavement Programs benefited greatly from community support this year. Through a Township of Langley Community Grant, supported by the work of one of our fabulous practicum students, Devan Christian, and the amazing talent of Kwantlen Polytechnic University Fine Art Graduates, Alyx Essers and Tessa Nickels, we celebrated the completion of a beautiful Narnia Room installation, situated in the Child and Youth Programs area of our Supportive Programs Centre. Another grant that Devan was instrumental in accessing from the MacLean Foundation saw us gain important funding to provide activity-based supports for our teen programs.

We would like to offer our thanks to the many people who have helped the children's bereavement programs flourish during the year: our wonderful Caring Hands quilters who provide quilts for all the children in our programs; the Children's Garden and Garden Committee volunteers for all of their hard work and dedication to the Children's Garden; all of our generous donors of labour and supplies for the Children's Garden, including the Fraser Valley Orchid Society and the Zoe Project Women's Group. Many thanks also to Thornton and Janet Smith for their help with memory boxes and art journals, Rhonda Dent for organizing our Moments In Focus teen photography project, Alenna Langhurst for her help with the teen yoga, Michelle Duckett, the Langley Rivermen hockey team for hosting us as VIP guests, and practicum student, Jessica Bedore. Other volunteers who gave a little extra this year: Wendy Sashikata, Konnor Mitterer, April Holland and Joleen Ogonoski - thanks to you all! And a big shout out to all of our camp volunteers - especially Dominic in the kitchen, and our amazing camp cook, Jaclyn Carmichael!

Palliative Support & Langley Hospice Residence

The palliative support program is going well. Our partnership with Fraser Health (FH) is very strong at the Langley Hospice Residence, with continued support to patients and families and enhancement of services provided by the nurses. This is carried out by volunteers who are onsite 12 hours a day, 7 days a week. We provide a weekly tea service, and our music program has now increased to twice a week; both are well-received and bring healing in a very subtle way. Therapeutic Touch is also available when requested by families or patients, once again providing extra care to supplement the work that the medical staff performs, and vigils are available in the last 72 hours of a person's life. As part of the hospice-palliative care team, LHS staff members attend rounds in both community and residence to maintain well-rounded support.

The focus on the "home-like" setting at the residence remains, and this past year was rather uneventful as compared to the previous one, where much energy was spent on re-upholstering of chairs, couches, and other types of changes. In an effort to provide a pleasant welcoming place, our focus this year was concentrated on the outside of the residence building. In April of last year, we started bringing in color in the form of flower arrangements in pots by the gazebo and in front of the entrance of the residence. The purpose was, and still is, to create a welcoming atmosphere prior to entering the premises. After much discussion with FH, landscaping material was also installed, pruning was done, railroad ties used as dividers were replaced, and the final touch was to cover the ground under the trees with crushed rocks, both in the front and the back. This project is still in progress.

In addition to supporting the nurses at the residence, with whom we have a wonderful working relationship, we also helped them by providing space for their training, meetings and debriefs, here at the Supportive Programs Centre.

As a Society we strongly believe in supporting and partnering with other agencies where possible, depending on their needs. We've had the opportunity on a few occasions, for example, to give tours of the residence to third year nursing students to help them have a deeper understanding of what hospice palliative care is, and to assist them in choosing the direction of nursing they want to undertake.

Another partnership was created last June. LHS was approached by Langley Lodge to help them with their dying population by providing vigils. In those few months, we have been able to really support clients, families and the staff at the Lodge. It is also important to note that throughout the year, LHS was also active in the community by supporting families doing respite or companionship via volunteers.

LHS extends a hand to the Langley community through the provision of telephone support to people from the community who need information on navigating the palliative system: what their next steps should be

regarding a loved one just diagnosed with a terminal illness, for example. This is a crucial service for people new to the palliative program and Fraser Health.

Volunteer numbers for the palliative programs varied from 42 - 45 people. During the year they gave over 6,000 hours of their valuable time. We greatly value the contributions of our volunteers, and provide continued support for this group of dedicated people with support meetings, opportunities for training, etc. We also

provided training sessions for people in the community wanting to give back - many do become volunteers, but for those who choose not to do so for whatever reason, they leave with a wealth of information, some tools, self-awareness, and with some ease of talking about death, dying and grief in their own personal lives.

Volunteer Programs

2014/2015 has been an exciting year for volunteers and events.

We have had 33,057 volunteer hours donated this year which is an increase of 5,072 hours over last year! The addition of the volunteer led Walking Group and Gardening Team along with the increase in special events we participated in has played a large role in the increase in numbers. It is wonderful to note we now have 16 volunteers who work in more than one area.

Every volunteer area has seen an increase in volunteer hours:

54 new volunteers have become part of the Hospice Society, with 24 of them joining Second Story Treasures! The retention rate at Second Story Treasures has improved substantially sitting at 83% compared to last year's 42%.

Langley Hospice is blessed to have a very diverse devoted group of volunteers, as such volunteer recognition plays a large role in thanking our volunteers for all that they help us to achieve. We continue to see a strong turnout for our volunteer appreciation events, this year I created a survey that was sent out to all volunteers to ensure our volunteer needs are being met. A surprising revelation was more than 70% of the surveys returned indicated our volunteers do not believe that gifts at the recognition events are necessary.

This year we teamed up with Langley Lodge for two events, the first being the Krause Berry Farms Butterfly Release, which was very well received by our volunteers and community. Four volunteers were on hand to help hand out butterflies. The second event was the Silver Screen Gala, 25 volunteers donated over 160 hours. The feedback received from volunteers was very enthusiastic. Other special events our volunteers participated in and enjoyed include the Bloom Market, Community Farmers Market, West Fine Arts Show, Garden Party and the Fraser Valley Orchid Society Show & Sale.

Celebrate a Life (CAL) once again impressive in the fact that all 86 shifts were filled by volunteers without the need for staff to step in. This year to help volunteers feel more confident in their role we ran a 2 hour CAL training, 17 volunteers attended! We will be continuing with the training and add in a Langley Hospice Society orientation for all new volunteers.

The Langley Hospice Society website is another area that has seen growth in the last few years. Being able to update our website on our own time and having the ability to tweak the look of events and pages has been an asset in volunteer recruitment and in advertising for our events.

Community Engagement & Fundraising

This has been another exciting year for the Langley Hospice Society. Our continued focus on community engagement has allowed us to explore and develop some exciting collaborations that have enabled us to raise awareness and important funds to support the work we do in the community, for the community.

One of this year's highlights has been an exciting partnership with Langley-based Horizon Landscape Contractors, that has seen our vision of an interactive Children's Garden installation on the grounds of our Langley Hospice Society's Supportive Programs Centre become a reality. From the very first conversation, the Horizon team embraced our vision and assisted us in engaging a landscape designer, and some amazing local businesses and suppliers. Much like the work we do, these kinds of projects really do "take a village", with Horizon at the helm, and support from businesses like Samara Design, Burnco Landscape Supply, Bella Turf, Pan American Nurseries, Forevergreen Landscaping, Rite-way Fencing Ltd., and Western Waterfarms, as well as a small and dedicated



group of our own Langley Hospice Volunteer Garden Committee members, this incredible space has come to life. This addition to our space will enable us to provide more interactive outdoor programming through our child and youth grief support programs and services.

On Thursday August 7, 2014, Ryan Jones rode his bike nearly 400 kilometres in one day from the Langley Hospice Residence to Kelowna and raised \$20,000.00 for the Langley Hospice Society in the name of Laurie Ann Lemon - the ride was aptly named the "Lemon Love Ride". Laurie is the late mother of Ryan's new wife, Andrea Lemon-Jones, who died in Hospice after a long battle with cancer in June of 2012. Laurie spent her final days and hours in the hospice residence, and received unparalleled care from its staff, and guidance in understanding, strength through the suffering and ongoing support for the loved ones from staff and volunteers alike. The Joneses felt this ride was a way to help raise important funds and awareness for the Langley Hospice Society to ensure the continuance of these very important supports.

We saw more than 2000 in attendance at this past September's **West Fine Art Show ~ Remembering Betty**, as it settled into its new location at the Thunderbird Show Park in North Langley. Well-known artists and show founders, Murray Phillips and Brian Croft of the West Fine Art Society, annually gather together some of the finest artists in Western Canada for this art show and sale, with partial proceeds supporting the Langley Hospice Society. The Tidball family and Thunderbird Show Park have generously offered to host this fabulous event again in 2015, and we look forward to this year's show which will be housed in a 4,100 square foot show space, donated by Phoenix Tent rentals, with a spectacular view of Thunderbird's International Hunter Jumper Show this August 21st to 23rd, 2015.

2014 also saw the Langley Hospice Society enter into a partnership with the Langley Care Foundation, co-hosting two community fundraising events: the Annual Butterfly Release hosted for the first time at the Krause Berry Farms and Estate Winery in July, and the Silver Screen Themed

Gala in October. These two events helped to raise important funds and awareness for our two Langley-based charities. Both events were well-attended and the partnership will continue this year. The Silverscreen Gala was well attended and included entertainment from celebrity impersonator Tracey Bell, live and silent auctions, raffle and prize draws, and the reveal of our "5 Things You Might Not Know About the Langley Hospice Society" by local YouTube sensations, Michael Thorne and Kristyl Clark of Fraser Valley 5. These fun filled events saw our two organizations raise over \$40,000 to help support the important programs and services we provide to individuals in the Langley community. We look forward to this year's collaborations with the **2nd Annual Butterfly Release** at Krause Farms on July 4th and the **6th Annual "Caring Hearts Gala"** on October 17th, 2015 at the Coast Hotel and Convention Centre in Langley.

Second Story Treasures Thrift Store

This was a year of transition and change for our Second Story Treasures Thrift Store in Walnut Grove. Now on the other side of some major staffing changes, with a new store manager and store assistant in place, and the support of the Langley Hospice Society's new Executive Director, the store staff and volunteers have all settled in nicely.

With change often come some growing pains, and the store saw a slight decline in revenue over the last year, sitting at close to a 13% decrease for the earlier part of the year, but with an increase in morale, and focused activity by staff and volunteers, sales rose considerably under the new management team, and saw SST end the year with only a 3% drop from the previous year's figures.

This meaningful recovery was due partly to a generous donation of furniture and household goods received over the final few months of the fiscal year, from a key supporter of the store. This large donation helped increase sales/revenue throughout February or March, which are usually months of decline, after the busy holiday season.

The Annual Fall Flip in August was once again a tremendous success due to the hard work of store staff and volunteers, with a one day sales total of \$4,150.00, followed by their Spring Flip in March that saw a final sales day total of over \$5,435.00.

I am so impressed by the pride and dedication we see displayed day in and day out by our volunteers and our staff team. It is so very true that many hands make light work, and Second Story Treasures is truly a successful team effort. I am looking forward to a great 2015/16 and really feel it will be one of the best years ever!
