Executive Director's Report

I am often reminded of the amazing and wonderful work of the Langley Hospice Society through a phone call, meeting families, talking to folks in the community or simply by a gentle touch from a loved one. It's not that I need to be reminded; it's just that we get so caught up in what we are doing we forget to take a breath and see what's around us. For me personally, this was never so true as when I recently experienced a great loss. I was in the US desperately trying to navigate my way through the medical system with the goal of finding good quality end-of-life care through hospice. To my dismay, the palliative and hospice care we so proudly provide didn't exist in the particular state I was in. Making end-of-life decisions on behalf of your loved one is difficult as it is, but for that person not to have the opportunity to experience the type of care and support we provide was devastating. I have learned an important thing from my experience: we, Langley Hospice Society, offer and provide the best care and support for the dying person, their friends, family and care givers at the end of life. We are quite simply second to none.

This past year has been exciting and challenging, but also one of significant growth. Our Children & Youth Program has expanded to two full-time staff in order to meet the needs of the community, particularly within the school system. The program continues to lead the way and be the model for child and youth grief and bereavement support throughout the province. Our innovative and creative programming has provided children and youth with a place of healing, understanding, compassion, and confidence.

Our Palliative and Adult Bereavement Programs continue to thrive. 2015 was the 10th anniversary for the interim Hospice Residence which, despite its aging building and surroundings,

provides excellent quality care and support to individuals at the end of life. Adult Bereavement introduced a new program entitled "Cooking for One" for those wishing to learn or re-learn basic cooking skills following the death of a loved one - a great success as ideas and tips were learned for cooking and new friendships grew between the participants. The Supportive Steps Walking Group is still going strong, having celebrated two years with many new members joining each week.

Second Story Treasures continues to be the place to go for good quality thrift store items and was recently voted North Langley's Best Non Profit/Program by Facebook's "My North Langley"- a fantastic recognition and one we are very proud of. Please be sure to contact them with any gently used items or furniture you may wish to donate.

Of course none of what we do would be possible without the support and dedication of our volunteers. Whether it is through our board, hospice residence, office, Second Story Treasures, or events, to name but a few, our volunteers are valued more than words can express as they truly are the heart of Langley Hospice Society. Thank you to each and every one.

As I experienced through my loss, life is so very precious. The work we do is personal, and I wish to thank our staff for their dedication, compassion and innovation as they strive to ensure ill persons, families and care givers

experience excellent quality end of life care, grief and bereavement support. You are all amazing.

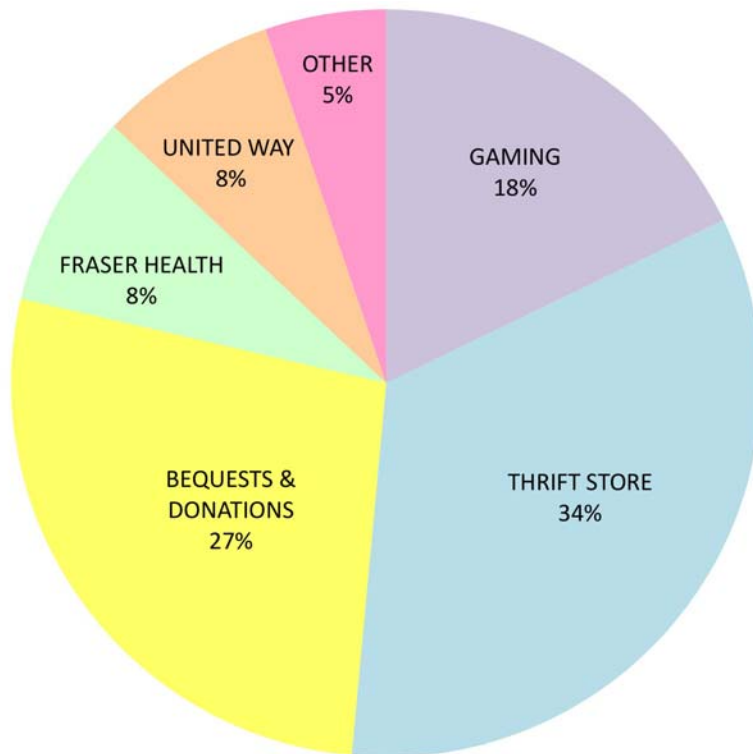
2016 is already unfolding as another milestone year...stay tuned for what promises to be an exciting future for Langley Hospice Society.

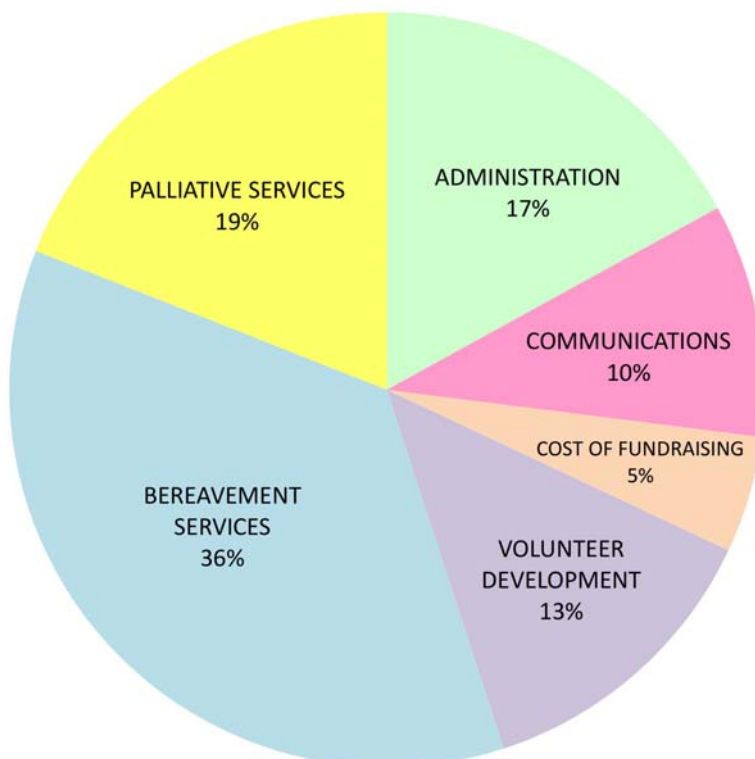


LANGLEY HOSPICE SOCIETY REVENUE/EXPENSES 2015/16

Adult Bereavement Support

As a result of an increase in community awareness and word-of-mouth testimonials from previous clients, the Adult Bereavement Program experienced an **increase in both office and community clients** in 2015/2016. Approximately 90% of the clients were self-referred or referred by a previous client, with many stating that loved ones had an extremely positive experience with utilizing our various services for adults.

Two ten-week-long adult bereavement groups were held during my time here: the first in September, 2015, and then again in January, 2016. Both groups had a mix of men and women in the group, and both started and retained their participant numbers throughout.

Our adult bereavement groups utilize Dr. Alan Wolfelt's basic grief support group structure, but have been modified to allow more time for people to talk about their losses. This enables clients to create relationships with other group members, build their own networks of support, and even, reach out to become part of Langley Hospice's volunteer population.

The program's walking group, **Supportive Steps**, has continued to grow in numbers with 10 to 15 people actively participating on a weekly basis. The two-year anniversary celebration consisted of 43 participants who enjoyed a walk around Langley and potluck lunch to follow.

The Living Waters Church generously provided funding for our new **Cooking for One** program. This program takes place in partnership with **Well-Seasoned Gourmet Food Store** in Langley, and is a lively group cooking session with the instructor giving tips on how to cook healthy meals for one person. Classes were held in November, 2015, and in January, March and May of 2016. All four classes have been very well-attended, and in all of the classes, participants asked if they could attend future sessions, partly for the knowledge they acquired, but often for the opportunity to meet other people who had lost someone. We look forward to securing funding for future offerings of this fabulous program.

We have received many community referrals for one-to-one bereavement support, from **Langley RCMP and Victim Services, Metis Family Services, Langley Gardens** and **The Renaissance**. We have been featured during presentations at the **Langley Seniors Resource Center** and at the **Redesigning Senior Care** workshop, held at **Timms Community Center**.

Child & Youth Bereavement Support



It has been amazing seeing our Horizons Children Garden grow from a dirt pile and our first attempts with wooden planters, to the wonderful setting we have today. It has been great seeing the children's memorial pieces and families' special mementos being added to the garden, along with the donation of a wishing well this year by one of our children's families. These additions and the hard work of our amazing garden committee volunteers have helped create a special place for the children and their families.

In celebration of the Horizon's Children's Garden we held our first ever **Family Day BBQ** with 75 people attending, including so many of the families we support and some great volunteers from our LHS programs and our Second Story Treasures Thrift Store. It was a day filled with fun, food and families, made possible by the efforts of Kwantlen third-year nursing students, Megan Salcack, Janice Johnathan and Tara Rahiman, who helped with food donations and day-of volunteers.

The Child and Youth Program held a **family memorial** for a teen boy who attends our program due to the loss of his mom, and then, a year and a half later, his dad. This was such an empowering event for him as he has a strong connection to Langley Hospice; it was extremely heart-warming and an honour to be a part of.

In many cultures around the world, the days at the end of October and beginning of November are considered an important time for honouring family and friends who have died. This past fall we held an **All Souls Event**, and decorated the yard with lights and lanterns, sharing food and memories with family and friends remembering their own loved ones.

This spring, utilizing our Children's Garden and outdoor spaces, we held our first **Spring Cycle of Life Day Camps** over two days with 29 children attending. Participants and volunteers explored the beginning of life in the garden, with the children planting sunflower seeds and painting bird houses.

In 2016, we held a four-day **Pre-Teen Leadership Course** for 10 children who have expressed interest in becoming future Camp Leaders at Camp Chrysalis, our annual Summer Camp. When I asked why they wanted to do this, all the pre-teens said they wanted to support the younger kids: "I want them to have the awesome experiences I've had at camp."

This year our part-time Child and Youth Worker position became a full-time Youth Outreach position, allowing us to provide bereavement support to students in their schools and help us take programs to the next level, helping to connect youth to each other and creating programming that is engaging and relevant to their experience.

Special thanks to Cassidy Peters, Devan Christian and Val Williams, and our practicum students Jessica Bedore, Angela Clarke, for all their work in the Child and Youth Program, all the amazing volunteers who support the Child and Youth Program, including the Caring Hands Quilting Group who provide beautiful quilts to the children who access our services, the Children's Garden and Garden Committee Volunteers for all of their hard work and dedication, and to The Stealth lacrosse and Langley Rivermen hockey teams for hosting us as VIP guests at their games.

Palliative Support & Langley Hospice Residence

It's hard to believe a whole year has gone by since we celebrated the 10-year anniversary of the opening of the interim Langley Hospice Residence, but we mark another year of continued support to our clients in the community and the Langley Hospice Residence. We look forward to a new residence but in the meantime we continue providing volunteers seven days a week, 12 hours a day, and making sure that the "home-like setting" remains.

Our hospice volunteers offer support and other services including: Reiki and Therapeutic Touch, as well as the music played in the hallway twice a week, and sometimes at an individual's bedside, by request. The smell of fresh coffee and tea follows our tea cart, another weekly service that delights all. Coloring for adults, initiated by a volunteer, was introduced as an activity for residents, and those who have felt drawn to it have said that it has improved the quality of their stay by relaxing them, taking their mind off things, and by creating inner peace.



New patients at the residence are now welcomed with the placing of a teddy bear and a welcome letter on their bed, prior to their arrival. Then, after the death of their loved one, the family receives a package with a candle and a poem, and important information about grief and how to reach LHS for bereavement support. Thus far, it has been well received.



Our amazing volunteer gardeners have been busy creating beauty outside of the residence, bringing a colorful, pleasant, peaceful entrance and backyard. Much planting, weeding, watering, feeding has been done to add to the welcoming atmosphere. In the back, where patients - in their beds, accompanied by family/friends and sometimes volunteers - go to enjoy the outdoors, many have commented on how pleasant and calming the experience of beautiful flowers can be, providing a sense of well-being and serenity during this time of their journey. We are grateful for the generous donation from the spouse of one of our residents, of a patio set for the area that allows loved ones to visit with family and friends in the sunlight and fresh air.

We continue to see clients in the community through referrals from the Hospice Palliative Care team, going into homes for respite or as a companion. We have seen an increase in referrals; but often close to the death so no long-term relationship is established with the patient and/or family. When requested, vigils are provided both at the residence and at Langley Lodge. We had the honor, on a few occasions, of accompanying the dying during their last hours. This on-going service brings peace of mind to families.

We offered two, 10-week-long Basic Training courses this year and had eleven new volunteers join our program, bringing the number of palliative volunteers to 45. I host a monthly support meeting for these volunteers, inviting them to share their experiences and stories in a safe environment, and honor the deceased that we have had the privilege of companioning.

In September of last year, I organized a workshop titled "As Long As There Is Breath", facilitated by Stan Tomandl and Ann Jacob. The intent was to provide extra tools to communicate with patients that might be confused, in a coma, or with dementia, enhancing the skills of volunteers and staff from many different backgrounds. The workshop was well attended and we received many positive comments. It is my hope to provide other workshops to refresh, enhance and learn new skills.

I can't end without saying that it is always an honor to work with the volunteers who, this year alone, have given nearly 6,000 hours of their valuable time ... the dedication, creativity, insights and intuition from this eclectic group of people always amazes me. They have discovered that it is the "small stuff" that really makes a difference. Their skills and caring expands in supporting the families, bringing their listening ears, giving tours to nervous families accompanying their loved ones on the day they arrive. Volunteers have observed that stress levels diminish to almost nothing and a sense of relief is often felt - having their loved one in an environment that they can trust.

As I look back on the 2015/2016 year, I am reminded once again how blessed the Langley Hospice Society is with the people that choose to give us the gift of their time. Our volunteer hours certainly reflect this: more than 30,000 hours were donated in this last fiscal year, which is equivalent to 17 full-time staff members.

Due to the ongoing growth of our Langley Hospice programs and services, it became apparent that we needed to provide a snapshot of the Society to our new and prospective volunteers, in order to help support them as they represent us within the community. Last year we hosted three volunteer orientations that focused on who we are and what we do, touched on how to support a grieving individual, and provided an overview of our volunteer programs. These

orientations were very well-received, with 36 participants attending.

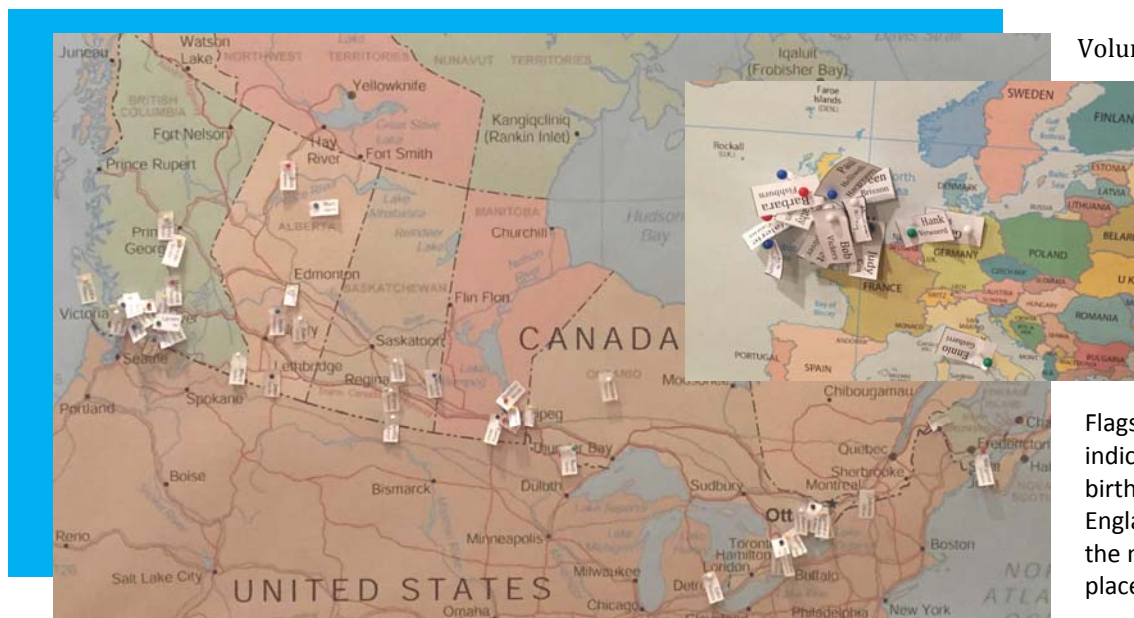
We have seen an increase in the numbers of people reaching out to the Society to volunteer. To help make the process easier, we have added an online component to our volunteer application process. Individuals are now able to fill out our online form and have it sent directly to the volunteer coordinator. This removes the uncertainty of trying to translate fax-distorted handwriting, while adding the ease of online communication. To date, 75 applications have been received online using this new format.

Langley Hospice is blessed to have a very diverse devoted group of volunteers, so volunteer recognition functions play a large role in thanking our volunteers for all that they help us to achieve. We continue to see a strong turnout for these appreciation events. An icebreaker we used this year showed us that, while a large portion of our volunteers were born in BC and through-out Canada, England was not very far behind!

The Langley Hospice Society website is another area that continues to see an increase in traffic. On average, 35 people visit our website each day! Being able to update our website on our own time and having the ability to tweak the look of events and pages has been an asset in volunteer recruitment and in promoting our events, programs and other activities.

I would like to take this opportunity to thank all of the folks that donate their precious spare time to the Langley Hospice Society, in whatever capacity. It is your efforts that make us a truly community-based organization.

Community Engagement & Fundraising

The Langley Hospice Society is committed to providing quality palliative and bereavement care and support to our growing community, and with diverse but limited funding sources, we fundraise annually to be able to continue to offer this type of quality programming in the community – for the community. We are grateful for the ongoing support of our amazing volunteers, donors, funders and supporters who help us to ensure these offerings remain free of charge for those who need them.

This last year has been another busy one for the Langley Hospice Society - we continue our focus on advocating and educating, training and supporting, and connecting with other like-minded organizations, service groups and volunteers and other palliative care advocates. We have been promoting the Hospice dream - gathering support from key stakeholders, politicians, donors and supporters, the general public and the medical community - all with the goal of a permanent hospice residence to serve the growing needs of the Langleys, and an ongoing commitment to ensuring access to quality palliative and bereavement care and support in our community.

We can't do it without the support of people like Roy Clements and the team from **Clemo's Crusade for Hospice**. In 2012, the Clements family lost their beloved wife and mother, Doreen, to terminal lung cancer. In the final weeks of her life, they reached out to the Langley Hospice Society; the caring and professional staff and volunteers at the hospice provided the support necessary to help manage Doreen's pain and provide comfort and support to her and her family. Doreen's passing was peaceful, loving and dignified, embodying all of the values that she herself had embraced.

Roy and his family started Clemo's Crusade for Hospice in Doreen's memory, undertaking a quest to raise important funds and awareness for the Langley Hospice Society and the importance of access to quality palliative and bereavement care and support. Roy, who is in his early 70's, travelled to England last spring and completed the Wainwright Coast to Coast Walk, a 300km journey on foot. This was just the beginning of a year and more of training and fundraising: in May, 2016, Roy set out to tackle the El Camino de Santiago, also known as the Pilgrimage Walk or the St. James Walk – a 800+km journey on foot from France to Spain. It is a journey he is in the midst of as we meet to celebrate the Langley



Hospice Society and another year of compassionate care and support in the community. Roy and the friends and family that make up the Clemo's Crusade team have hosted a number of pub nights and other fundraising events leading up to his trek. To date, with generous support from the community, they have raised over \$15,000 in support of the Langley Hospice Society and the work that we do.

In August of 2015, our third annual **West Fine Art Show – Remembering Betty**, now hosted annually on the grounds of the Thunderbird Show Park in North Langley, had their most successful year to date. This art show and sale, hosted in partnership with the West Fine Art Society (www.westart.ca), brings together some of the finest artists in Western Canada and contributes partial proceeds to support the Langley Hospice Society in memory of Betty Phillips, the late wife of show founder and West Fine Art Society president, Murray Phillips. Over the last three years, this amazing group of talented artists has raised almost \$40,000.00 in support of the Langley Hospice Society. **We look forward to this year's show, August 19-21, 2016 at the Thunderbird Show Park.**

The **Butterfly Release**, hosted annually in July at the Krause Berry Farms and Estate Winery, and one of two events held in partnership with the Langley Care Foundation last year, saw more than 250 monarch butterflies released on the grounds. With entertainment by country music artist, Trevor Murray, volunteer-led children's crafts and activities, and face painting at this fabulous local location, **this year's Butterfly Release is scheduled for Saturday, July 9th** and is seeing pre-orders for butterflies well in advance of event day.

We enter the new fiscal year with excitement following the recent announcement that the Langley Hospice Society has been offered a site by Fraser Health to build a 15 bed, free-standing hospice residence for Langley. This is a goal our board, staff and volunteers have been working tirelessly towards since their humble beginnings around a kitchen table more than 30 years ago. We are incredibly excited to be moving forward and request your ongoing support to make this a reality for our community.

All this has increased our store traffic, which has enabled us to not only surpass our sales from last year (2014-2015), but to outperform the previous year (2013-2014) as well.

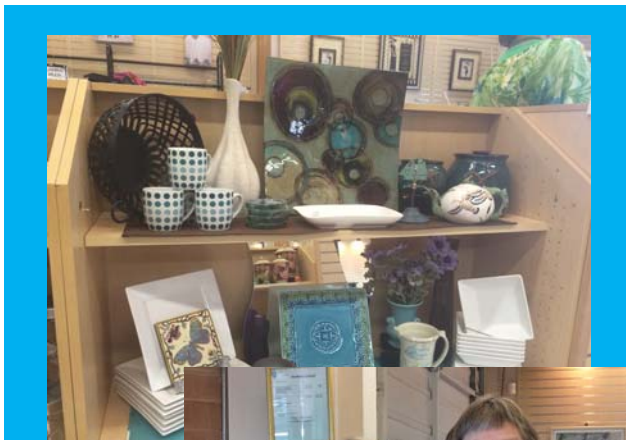
A noted success this year was in our clothing area. After noticing a significant decline in our clothing sales - which stood out because we were experiencing increases in many other areas - we began to suspect that shoplifting was taking a toll. The solution was to assign a volunteer to manage the dressing rooms, and thanks to the work of our volunteers in this role, the store ended the year with a 4% increase in clothing.

As a goal-oriented person, I always tend to set my bar a little high, and I knew that with our dedicated volunteers and staff we could have the best year ever. We finished the 2015/16 year with a 7.3% increase in overall sales.

Always a highlight for customers, our Annual Fall Flip in August was a tremendous success due to the hard work of store staff and volunteers, with a two-day sales total of \$5,737.00 - and that's with a half-day closure due to a power failure in the area! Our Spring Fling followed in March and didn't disappoint with a two-day sales total of over \$7,900.00.

I am so impressed by the pride and dedication we see displayed day in and day out by our volunteers and our staff team. As the saying goes, "many hands make light work", and Second Story Treasures is truly a successful team effort. I am looking forward to another great year.
